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Spring on the Trail:

Spring greetings to all members and users of the Harte Trail. The Friends of the Harte Trail would like to extend a special welcome to all our new neighbours in the Ridgewood South neighbourhood.

Trail Tidbits:

Do you know where the name of your Harte Trail originated? To answer that question it is necessary to go back into railway history a bit. The Harte Subdivision was the first section of track that was built by the Grand Trunk Railway in western Canada and was in use from 1894 to 1972. The Subdivision took its name from a small community that was a short distance west of Winnipeg. That community no longer exists. Trains used to leave downtown Winnipeg and pass by Pacific Junction Station on their way to Portage La Prairie. If you walk Eastward on the trail from Elmhurst you will, on your right, come across a commutative plaque with information and photographs of Pacific Junction station and you can still see some of the original wooden railroad ties to which the steel rails were attached.



The Prairie Dog Central Rail Road ran its steam locomotive on the Harte Subdivision tracks from 1970 to 1974. People boarded the train at Elmhurst and travelled west, crossed the Perimeter Highway and then on to their destination. After a short break the train returned back to the Elmhurst station. The last run for the Prairie Dog Central was September 1974.

In August 1975 the rails and ties were taken up leaving and empty rail bed. This rail bed would become your Harte Trail. More on that development process in another edition.



Tree planting:

We were going to mark International Trails Day on June 2nd with a tree-planting event. The weather didn't cooperate, so we held it on June 6th.

Thank-you to Jeffries Nurseries and the City of Winnipeg Parks department for their donations of trees and scrubs.

Thank-you as well to the volunteers of all ages who came out to help. It's just a guess, but I'd say the range was from about 3 – 75. It was great to see the volunteers of the future out with their parents!

Seventy native trees and scrubs were planted along the Trail, west of Cullen. Check out the new additions. City Parks staff and members of the Green Team will care for them until they are established. Our plan is to do plantings over the years, in the spring and fall, with a goal of reaching the Perimeter. Watch for notice of the fall planting and come join in the fun.











Natural History:

Whether you walk, run or cycle along the trail you see many different types of trees, shrubs, grasses and flowering plants.

The two most common trees you see are the Trembling Aspen (Poplar) and the Oak (Bur Oak).

Poplar:





Aspen is one of the first trees to grow in an area that had a forest fire. Aspen do produce seeds but most new trees star from special underground shoots from a mature tree.

The thick bark of the Oak tree helps protect it from grass and forest fires. The Oak tree is the one that produces acorns as seeds.

American Goldfinch:

Watch for the bright yellow goldfinch.



These little guys are common on the Trail. They love thistles and other seed producing plants. You can see them peeling back

the covering to get at the seeds.

Goldfinches fly in an undulating pattern, often singing. If you watch and listen, you'll notice that they sing when they are flying upward in the pattern.

As with most birds, the male has the bright yellow plumage, but, unlike most birds, he gets it by moulting. In the fall, goldfinches moult and both sexes take on nearly the same plumage: buff-coloured below with olive brown backs.



In the spring they again moult and lose all but their black wing and tail feathers and their beaks turn orange. Then the male grows in his bright yellow plumage and black cap.
